Since its first commit on 17 Feb 2014, the libIIO has seen many improvements by many contributors. Regular releases every 6 months delivers stable updates to users and developers, each with new features, new examples, added device support, and improved performance. Each of these releases contains the work of over 45 developers representing over 25 corporations.

Although the libIIO would not exist without the initial support of Analog Devices, it is an open source source project, and relies on the contributions of many people. Being used across the cloud, mobile, embedded, and supercomputing applications, ensures that it supports many different use cases and applications.

The numbers in the following tables are drawn from the entire git repository history. Periodically (at least once a release), we run a script included in this file to update this file. This does not include the people working on the kernel side, writing the actual Linux kernel IIO device drivers, or tiny-iiod the deeply embedded iio daemon.
