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"Affiliate" of a Party shall mean an entity (i) which is directly or indirectly controlling such Party; (ii) which is under the same direct or indirect ownership or control as such Party; or (iii) which is directly or indirectly owned or controlled by such Party. 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9. CONFIDENTIALITY

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10.6 Governing Law and Legal Venue

This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of Finland, excluding its choice of law provisions.
