Installation Methods

This guide covers the following installation methods for Cisco Unified Communications Manager and the IM and Presence Service:

Installation Method	Description
Basic Install of Cluster	<p>This method contains the typical installation of a Cisco Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service cluster. In this method, you must install the publisher node first, and then add and install your subscriber nodes.</p> <p>Basic Installation includes the following custom cases:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Apply a Patch During an Upgrade—If a newer version exists than the image that you are installing, you can apply a patch to your install image and upgrade to the newer version. This option is available for Unified Communications Manager only.• Pre-installed Software—If you have a new server with either Unified Communications Manager or IM and Presence Service software pre-installed (for example, Cisco Business Edition) you can configure the pre-installed software.
Touchless Install of Cluster	<p>Touchless installation allows you to complete a full cluster installation for Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service in one seamless process. Once you provide the server details for all cluster nodes and start the installation, the system installs software on all cluster nodes dynamically, without manual intervention from the administrator. This method is particularly useful if you have a large cluster to install.</p>

Installation Method	Description
Add a Node to a Cluster	Use these procedures to add and install a new node in an existing cluster. The new node(s) must be added as a subscriber node.



Note You can also use Cisco Prime Collaboration Deployment to install your cluster. For more information, see *Cisco Prime Collaboration Deployment Administration Guide*.

Topology Options

This section provides an overview of the system topology and describes the relationship between the types of nodes in the topology.

Clusters

Clusters provide a mechanism for distributing call processing, presence status, and database replication among multiple servers. They provide transparent sharing of resources and features, and enable system scalability.

A cluster comprises a set of Unified Communications Manager nodes and IM and Presence nodes that run compatible software versions.

Publisher Nodes and Subscriber Nodes

Within a cluster, there is a database publisher for each type of node that you install.

When you install Unified Communications Manager, the installation wizard prompts you to specify whether the node you are installing is the first node in the cluster. The first Unified Communications Manager node that you install becomes the publisher node, because it publishes the voice and video database to the other Unified Communications Manager nodes in the cluster. All subsequent nodes in the cluster are called subscriber nodes. Each subscriber node must be associated with the publisher node. You must set up all subscriber nodes in the system topology on the publisher node before you install the software on the subscriber nodes.

When you install IM and Presence nodes, the first node that you install functions as the server for the IM and Presence database. Because this node publishes the database for all of the IM and Presence nodes in the cluster, it is referred to as the IM and Presence database publisher; however, you must install this and all other IM and Presence nodes as subscribers of the Unified Communications Manager publisher node. As with other subscriber nodes, you must add these in the system topology before you install the software.

Topology Options

When installing your cluster, you must decide on the topology that you want to deploy. For example:

- The number of cluster nodes required.
- Whether you will install all cluster nodes in a single location, or if you will install your nodes in separate geographic sites connected via a WAN in order to provide geographic redundancy. For more information on scalability, see [Megacluster](#).

Cluster Topology for IM and Presence

If you are deploying the IM and Presence Service, you must decide before you begin the installation whether you want a Standard Deployment (IM and Presence Service on Unified Communications Manager) or an IM and Presence Centralized Cluster Deployment.

IM and Presence Deployment	Description
Standard Deployment (de-centralized/distributed)	<p>The IM and Presence Service cluster nodes are installed on the physical servers as the Unified Communications Manager telephony cluster. The IM and Presence cluster shares a platform and many of the same services as the telephony cluster. This option requires a 1x1 mapping of Unified CM telephony clusters to IM and Presence clusters.</p> <p>Basic installations order followed is same as mentioned in the Attended Install method. For more information, see the "Installation Methods".</p> <p>For touchless installations, you can install all Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service cluster nodes concurrently in a single process.</p>
IM and Presence Centralized Cluster Deployment	<p>The IM and Presence Service central cluster is installed separately from your telephony cluster and may be located on different hardware servers. This deployment removes the 1x1 mapping requirement between telephony clusters and IM and Presence clusters. This allows you to scale your telephony deployment and IM and Presence deployment separately.</p> <p>For basic installations:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Install a local Unified Communications Manager publisher node in the central cluster. This node is not a part of your telephony deployment. The node handles functions like database and user provisioning for the central cluster. 2. Install the IM and Presence Service database publisher node. 3. Install any IM and Presence subscriber nodes. <p>For touchless installations, you can install your local Unified Communications Manager publisher node and your IM and Presence Service central cluster in a single process. However, your telephony cluster must be installed separately.</p> <p>For more information, see the "Configure Centralized Deployment" chapter at Configuration and Administration of the IM and Presence Service Guide.</p>

Requirements and Limitations

The following sections provide information about the requirements that your system must meet, and limitations that apply when you install or upgrade Unified Communications Manager or IM and Presence Service.



Note If you upgrade Unified Communications Manager which has IPsec configured using a certificate-based authentication with self-signed certificate, then the upgrade fails. To perform a successful upgrade, you have to reconfigure the IPsec policy with a CA-signed certificate.



Note

- By default, your system is in non-FIPS mode, you must enable it, if desired.
- Ensure that the security password length is minimum 14 characters before you enable FIPS, Common Criteria, or Enhanced Security mode on the cluster. Update the password even if the prior version was FIPS enabled.



Note Unified Communications Manager 12.5 requires minimum ESXi version of 6.5 U2 with minimum VM Hardware version of 13. For more information on latest Unified Communications Manager ESXi version support, see <http://www.cisco.com/go/virtualized-collaboration>.

Subnet Limitations

Do not install Unified Communications Manager in a large Class A or Class B subnet that contains a large number of devices. For more information, see [Cisco Collaboration System 12.x Solution Reference Network Designs \(SRND\)](#).

Cluster Size

The number of Unified Communications Manager subscriber nodes in a cluster cannot exceed 4 subscriber nodes and 4 standby nodes, for a total of 8 subscribers. The total number of servers in a cluster, including the Unified Communications Manager publisher node, TFTP server, and media servers, cannot exceed 21.

The maximum number of IM and Presence Service nodes in a cluster is 6.

IP Address Requirements

A complete collaboration solution relies on DNS in order to function correctly for a number of services and thus requires a highly available DNS structure in place. If you have a basic IP telephony deployment and do not want to use DNS, you can configure Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service to use IP addresses rather than hostnames to communicate with gateways and endpoint devices.

You must configure the server to use static IP addressing to ensure that the server obtains a fixed IP address. Using a static IP address also ensures that Cisco Unified IP Phones can register with the application when you plug the phones into the network.

DNS requirements

Note the following requirements:

- Mixed-mode DNS deployments not supported—Cisco does not support mixed-mode deployments. Both Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service must either use or not use DNS.
- If your deployment uses DNS—Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service should use the same DNS server. If you use different DNS servers between IM and Presence Service and Unified Communications Manager, it is likely to cause abnormal system behavior.
- If your deployment does not use DNS, you will need to edit the following Host Name/IP Address fields:
 - Server—In the Cisco Unified CM Administration **Server Configuration** window, set IP addresses for your cluster nodes.
 - IM and Presence UC Service—In the Cisco Unified CM Administration **UC Service Configuration** window, create an IM and Presence UC service that points to the IP address of the IM and Presence database publisher node.
 - CCMCIP Profiles—In the Cisco Unified CM IM and Presence Administration **CCMCIP Profile Configuration** window, point any CCMCIP profiles to the IP address of the host.
- Multinode considerations—If you are using the multinode feature in IM and Presence Service, see the section regarding multinode deployments in the [Configuration and Administration of the IM and Presence Service Guide](#) for DNS configuration options.

Firewall Requirements

Ensure that you configure your firewall so that connections to port 22 are open, and aren't throttled. During the installation of Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence subscriber nodes, multiple connections to the Unified Communications Manager publisher node are opened in quick succession. Throttling these connections could lead to a failed installation. For general security considerations, see the [Security Guide for Cisco Unified Communications Manager](#).



Note We recommend that you disable the "Intruder/Intrusion Detection" and/or "Brut Force Attack" features during upgrade and installs because these Firewall features are known to cause upgrades and installations to fail.

For more information on the port usage, see the chapter 'Cisco Unified Communications Manager TCP and UDP Port Usage' in the [System Configuration Guide for Cisco Unified Communications Manager](#).

Platform Requirements

In this release, you cannot install or run Unified Communications Manager and the IM and Presence Service directly on server hardware; you must run these applications on virtual machines.

Before you can install or upgrade the software on a virtual machine, you must:

- configure the platform
- install and configure ESXi virtualization software



Note Unified Communications Manager 12.5 requires minimum ESXi version of 6.5 U2 with minimum VM Hardware version of 13. For latest Unified Communications Manager ESXi version support, see <http://www.cisco.com/go/virtualized-collaboration>.

- deploy the correct OVA template for the release

This section provides information about the platform requirements that you must meet before you can deploy Unified Communications Manager and the IM and Presence Service on virtual machines.

Supported Versions

The following software versions apply to Release 12.5(1):

- Unified Communications Manager 12.5.1.10000-22
- IM and Presence Service Service 12.5.1.10000-22

Version Mismatches

This release offers two main deployment options for this release of Unified Communications Manager and the IM and Presence Service Service:

- Standard Deployments—Both Unified Communications Manager and the IM and Presence Service Service must be running the above 12.5.1.10000-22 version for your deployment to be supported. A version mismatch is not supported.
- Centralized Deployments of IM and Presence Service Service—If you have the Centralized Deployment option configured on the IM and Presence Service Service, then within the IM and Presence Service central cluster, both the Unified Communications Manager instance and the IM and Presence Service Service must be running a 12.5.1.10000-22 version. However, the telephony cluster that the central cluster connects to does not have to be running a 12.5.1.10000-22 version.

Software Restrictions

You cannot install or use third-party or Windows-based software applications. The system can upload and process only software that Cisco Systems provides and digitally signs. For more information, see the 'Operating System and Security Hardening' chapter in the [Security Guide for Cisco Unified Communications Manager](#).

You must perform all software installations and upgrades using Cisco Unified Communications Operating System Administration.

For information about software compatibility for Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service, see the [Compatibility Matrix for Cisco Unified Communications Manager and the IM and Presence Service](#).

Username and Password Requirements

During the installation, you must specify the following user names and passwords:

- Administrator Account user name and password
- Application User name and password
- Security password



Note We recommend that you use a different username for the Cisco Unified Communications Operating System Administration and the Cisco Unified CM Administration interfaces.

Administrator Account

You use the Administrator Account user name and password to log in to the following areas:

- Cisco Unified Communications Operating System Administration
- Disaster Recovery System
- Command Line Interface

To specify the Administrator Account user name and password, follow these guidelines:

- Administrator Account user name—The Administrator Account user name must start with an alphabetic character and can contain alphanumeric characters, hyphens, and underscores.
- Administrator Account password—The Administrator Account password must be at least six characters long and can contain alphanumeric characters, hyphens, and underscores.

You can change the Administrator Account password or add a new Administrator account by using the command line interface. For more information, see the [Command Line Interface Reference Guide for Cisco Unified Communications Solutions](#).

Application User

When you install Unified Communications Manager, you must enter an Application User name and password. You use the Application User name and password to access applications that are installed on the system, including the following areas:

- Cisco Unified CM Administration
- Cisco Unified Serviceability
- Cisco Real-Time Monitoring Tool
- Cisco Unified Reporting

To specify the Application User name and password, follow these guidelines:

- Application User username—The Application User username must start with an alphabetic character and can contain alphanumeric characters, hyphens, and underscores.
- Application User password—The Application User password must be at least six characters long and can contain alphanumeric characters, hyphens, and underscores.



Caution Do not use the system application name as the Application User name. Using a system application name causes the installation to fail with an unrecoverable error during the installation of the database.

System application names are:

- CCMSysUser
- WDSysUser
- CCMQRTSysUser
- IPMASysUser
- WDSecureSysUser
- CCMQRTSecureSysUser
- IPMASecureSysUser
- TabSyncSysUser
- CUCService

You can change the Application User name and password by using the command line interface. For more information, see the [Command Line Interface Reference Guide for Cisco Unified Communications Solutions](#).

Security Password

During the installation, you must specify a security password. Unified Communications Manager systems use this password to authorize communications between nodes in the cluster, including IM and Presence Service nodes. This password must be identical on all nodes in the cluster.

The Security password must be at least six characters long and can contain alphanumeric characters, hyphens, and underscores.

Password Recommendations

The installation wizard ensures that you enter a strong password. To create a strong password, follow these recommendations:

- Password must be at least 6 characters long and can contain alphanumeric characters, hyphens, and underscore.



Note If you plan to enable FIPS, Common Criteria, or Enhanced Security mode on any cluster, you must ensure that the security password is at least 14 characters long.

- Should not have the non-printable ASCII characters.
- Contains at least one alphanumeric character.
- Mix uppercase and lowercase letters.
- Mix letters and numbers.

- Include special symbols.
- Remember that longer passwords are stronger and more secure than shorter ones.

Avoid the following types of passwords:

- Do not use only alphanumeric characters.
- Do not use any non-alphanumeric characters.
- Do not use recognizable words, such as proper names and dictionary words, even when combined with numbers.
- Do not invert-recognizable words.
- Do not use word or number patterns, such as aaabbb, abc123, qwerty, zyxwvuts, and 123321.
- Do not use recognizable words from other languages.
- Do not use personal information of any kind, including birthdays, postal codes, names of children, or pets.

Installation Time Requirements

Time Requirements for Unified Communications Manager

The entire installation process, excluding pre- and post-installation tasks, takes 45 to 90 minutes, depending on your server type.

Time Requirements for IM and Presence Nodes

The entire IM and Presence Service installation process, excluding pre- and post-installation tasks, takes approximately 45 to 90 minutes per server, depending on your server type.

Licensing Requirements

The following sections provide information about the licensing requirements for Unified Communications Manager and the IM and Presence Service.



Note As of Unified Communications Manager Release 12.0(1), Smart Licensing replaces Prime License Manager. Smart Licensing requires you to have a Smart Account created and configured before you upgrade or migrate the Unified Communications Manager server.

Several deployment options through which Unified Communications Manager can connect to Cisco Smart Software Manager or Cisco Smart Software Manager satellite are:

- Direct—Unified Communications Manager sends usage information directly over the internet. No additional components are needed.
- Cisco Smart Software Manager satellite—Unified Communications Manager sends usage information to an on-premise Smart Software Manager. Periodically, an exchange of information is performed to

keep the databases in synchronization. For more information on installation or configuration of the Smart Software Manager satellite, go to this URL: <https://www.cisco.com/c/en/us/buy/smart-accounts/software-manager.html>.



Note Cisco Smart Software Manager satellite is an on-premises collector similar to a standalone Prime License Manager.

- Proxy Server—Unified Communications Manager sends usage information over the internet through a proxy server.

Unified Communications Manager License Requirements

Cisco Smart Software Licensing is a new way of thinking about licensing. It adds flexibility to your licensing and simplifies it across the enterprise. It also delivers visibility into your license ownership and consumption.

Cisco Smart Software Licensing helps you to procure, deploy, and manage licenses easily where devices self-register and report license consumption, removing the need for product activation keys (PAK). It pools license entitlements in a single account and allows you to move licenses freely through the network, wherever you need them. It is enabled across Cisco products and managed by a direct cloud-based or mediated deployment model.

The Cisco Smart Software Licensing service registers the product instance, reports license usage, and obtains the necessary authorization from Cisco Smart Software Manager or Cisco Smart Software Manager satellite.

Cisco Smart Software Manager replaces Prime License Manager in Unified Communications Manager Release 12.0(1) and later versions. Cisco Prime License Manager is no longer used as of Release 12.0(1) and no longer appears in the Installed Applications pre-login screen.

If you have enabled the mixed-mode before upgrade and have not registered to Cisco Smart Software Manager or Cisco Smart Software Manager satellite then,

- You see the warning message in the Cisco Unified CM Administration page and Cisco Unified OS Administration page as stated below:



Caution The system is currently running Mixed mode. To continue running Mixed mode, please ensure Smart Licensing registration is completed using the Registration Token received from the Smart/Virtual Account that has Allow export-controlled functionality checked.

- An alert named *SmartLicenseExportControlNotAllowed* is sent, when the Unified Communications Manager is not registered with the Registration Token.

Migration of PLM Licenses to Smart Entitlement

If you are eligible to upgrade to the Smart Licensing version of the product, then you are able to initiate the migration through the [License Registration Portal](#) or [Cisco Smart Software Manager](#). You can self-initiate this process by downloading and installing the Smart Licensing version of the software and registering the device to a Smart Account using a Registration Token. The migration of any entitlements tracked by Cisco automatically migrates to the Customers Smart Account. You will also be able to initiate the migration of unused classic PAKs to Smart Accounts for future consumption by products in Smart Mode. This process is available through the [License Registration Portal](#) or [Cisco Smart Software Manager](#).

Unified Communications Manager 9.0x and later version of 12.0(1)

- If you are holding an active Cisco Software Support Service (SWSS) contract, then you can convert the classic licenses to smart entitlements through the Cisco Smart Software Manager at <https://software.cisco.com/#SmartLicensing-LicenseConversion>.
- Two types of Migration are supported:
 - PAK based—Supported for already fulfilled, partially fulfilled and unfulfilled PAKs
 - Device based
- Partial Conversion supports mixed environment of older and Unified Communications Manager 12.0(1) clusters.

Upgrade to Smart Entitlement

Unified Communications Manager Pre 9.0x (Device based) to 12.0(1)

You may contact Cisco Global Licensing Operations (GLO) for helping with migrating Device-based licenses to Smart Entitlement.

Customer may establish equivalent user-based licensing required by running License Count Utility (LCU). For more details, see http://www.cisco.com/c/en/us/td/docs/voice_ip_comm/cucm/upgrade/uct/CUCM_BK_UCT_Admin_Guide/CUCM_BK_UCT_Admin_Guide_chapter_01.html.

From the LCU report, Customer may order respective quantity of Upgrade Licenses through Cisco Commerce Workspace. Beyond this, they would have to buy additional new licenses. IM and Presence Service License Requirements

The IM and Presence Service does not require a server license or software version license. However, you must assign users and enable the IM and Presence Service for each assigned user.



Note With the Jabber for Everyone offer, no end user licenses are required to enable IM and Presence Service functionality. For more information, see [Jabber for Everyone Quick Start Guide](#).

You can assign IM and Presence Service on a per user basis, regardless of the number of clients you associate with each user. When you assign IM and Presence Service to a user, this enables the user to send and receive IMs and availability updates. If users are not enabled for IM and Presence Service, they will not be able to log in to the IM and Presence Service server to view the availability of other users, send or receive IMs, and other users will not see their availability status.

You can enable a user for IM and Presence Service using any of the following options:

- The **End User Configuration** window in Unified Communications Manager. For more information, see the [Administration Guide for Cisco Unified Communications Manager](#).
- The Bulk Administration Tool (BAT)
- Assign IM and Presence Service to a feature group template which you can reference from the **Quick User/Phone Add** window in Unified Communications Manager.

For more information, see the [System Configuration Guide for Cisco Unified Communications Manager](#).

IM and Presence Service capabilities are included within both User Connect Licensing (UCL) and Cisco Unified Workspace Licensing (CUWL). IM and Presence Service capabilities can also be acquired for users that are not Unified Communications Manager IP Telephony users through the Jabber for Everyone Offer. For more information, see [Jabber for Everyone Quick Start Guide](#).

Required Installation Information

When you install either Unified Communications Manager or the IM and Presence Service on a server, the installation process requires you to provide specific information. You can provide this information manually during the installation process or you can provide it using an answer file. For each server that you install in a cluster, you must gather this information before you begin the installation process.

The following table lists the information that you must gather before you begin the installation.



Note Because some of the fields are optional, they may not apply to your configuration. For example, if you decide not to set up an SMTP host during installation, the parameter still displays, but you do not need to enter a value.

You cannot change some of the fields after the installation without reinstalling the software, so be sure to enter the values that you want. The last column in the table shows whether you can change a parameter after installation, and if you can, it provides the appropriate menu path or Command Line Interface (CLI) command.

We recommend that you make copies of this table and record your entries for each server in a separate table, even if you are planning to use the DMABackupInfo.inf file to configure your system.

Export Restricted and Export Unrestricted Software

This release of Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service supports an export unrestricted (XU) version, in addition to the export restricted (K9) version.



Note Unrestricted versions of software are intended only for a specific set of customers who do not want various security capabilities; unrestricted versions are not intended for general deployments.

Export unrestricted versions differs from restricted versions as follows:

- Encryption of user payload (information exchange) is not supported.
- External SIP interdomain federation with Microsoft OCS/Lync or AOL is not supported.
- After you install an unrestricted release, you can never upgrade to a restricted version. A fresh install of a restricted version on a system that contains an unrestricted version is also not supported.
- All nodes within a single cluster must be in the same mode. For example, Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service in the same cluster must either all be in unrestricted mode or all be in restricted mode.

- IP Phone security configurations are modified to disable signaling and media encryption (including encryption provided by the VPN phone feature).



Note Be aware that after you install an unrestricted release, you can never upgrade to a restricted version. You are not allowed to perform a fresh installation of a restricted version on a system that contains an unrestricted version.

For all Graphical User Interfaces (GUIs) and Command Line Interfaces (CLIs), the Administrator can view the product version (restricted or export unrestricted).

- Make sure that the subscriber nodes that you are installing can connect to the publisher node server during the installation.
- Make sure that all Unified Communications Manager servers in a cluster have the same software version. Make sure that all IM and Presence servers in a cluster have the same version of the released software.

The only exception is during a cluster software upgrade, during which a temporary mismatch is allowed. If you are installing IM and Presence nodes, Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service software versions must have the same major and minor release number.

- If you are installing on an existing cluster, do not attempt to perform any configuration tasks during the installation.
- Be aware that directory names and filenames that you enter while you are running the installation program are case-sensitive.
- For IM and Presence Service installations, make sure that you know whether you are installing IM and Presence Service in a Centralized Deployment or in a Standard Deployment (Decentralized). For details, see [Cluster Topology for IM and Presence, on page 3](#).

Note If you have a Cisco Business Edition 6000/7000 appliance with the software pre-installed, you do not need to install from a DVD or ISO file, unless you want to re-image the server with a later product release. Go directly to the configure basic installation procedure to enter the configuration information. - Step 4** In the **Software Location of Data to Import** section, check the **Configure Software Location of Data to Import** check box to configure Remote SFTP server details only if you choose to install using the Fresh Install with Data Import. Else ignore this step and proceed to step 5. For more details, see **Install with Data Import** installation method.
- By checking the **Configure Software Location of Data to Import** check box it disables, Administrator Credentials, Security Password, Application User Credentials fields. These details are imported from source node data during installation. Enter the following fields:
- **Remote Server Name or IP**—The Secure FTP (SFTP) server that stores the source cluster's exported data.
 - **Export Data Directory**—Directory path of the server containing export data.
 - **Remote Server Login ID**—Allows data retrieval of the remote SFTP server.
 - **Remote Server Password**—Can contain alphanumeric characters, hyphens, and underscores.
- Step 5** Complete the remaining fields under **Clusterwide Configuration** with your cluster configuration details.
- Step 6** Complete the fields in the **Primary Node Configuration** with configuration details for the publisher node.
- Step 7** Check the **Dynamic Cluster Config Enable** check box and enter a value, in hours, for the Dynamic cluster Config Timer.
- Note** This check box must be checked if you want to install your full cluster in a single process. Otherwise, you will need to either configure this option later through the CLI, or add your subscriber nodes manually after the publisher node installs.
- Step 8** Under **Secondary Node Configuration**, enter the node details for your first subscriber node and click **Add Secondary Node**.
- Step 9** Add all your subscriber nodes.
- Step 10** Add all your cluster nodes and click **Generate Answer files**.
- Step 11** Download the answer files to your computer.

Step 12 Repeat this procedure to generate answer files for the IM and Presence Service cluster.

Notes for Basic and Touchless Installs



Important

After you install a new node on an existing cluster, if you plan to utilize Cisco CallManager or Cisco TFTP services, we recommend that you restart all of the phones in your cluster to get the latest ITL file. If you are using a Certificate Trust List (CTL), you will also need to update this file manually by running the `utils ctl update CTLFile` CLI command (using Tokenless CTL) or by updating the file via the CTL Client (Legacy USB tokens). After you update the CTL file, you must restart phones so that they can download the latest CTL file. For additional details on the CTL File, see the "Cisco CTL Client Setup" chapter of the *Security Guide for Cisco Unified Communications Manager*.



Note

- You can collect the logs from RTMT of a new node added to the existing FQDN cluster, only when you restart the trace collection service. When you sign in to Unified RTMT without restarting the trace collection, the following error message is displayed: .

```
Could not connect to 'Server' <new node name>
```

- If you install a new node to an existing cluster where the IM and Presence server is not upgraded to the supported version or if the IM and Presence server has been decommissioned, the following error message is displayed:

```
"Add failed. Upgrade and migration for Cisco Unified IM & Presence Servers that are associated with this cluster appears to be pending (not complete). Please make sure upgrade and migration of all IM & Presence servers is completed successfully before adding servers to this cluster. Please check for any unused IM & Presence Application Servers and delete them".
```



Note A touchless install cannot be used to simultaneously install multiple Unified Communications Manager and multiple IM and Presence Service nodes. The following scenarios are supported:

- Installing only multiple Unified Communications Manager nodes
- Installing only one Unified Communications Manager node (publisher) and multiple IM and Presence Service nodes

If you need to simultaneously install multiple Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service nodes, you need to use one of the above scenarios and install additional nodes manually.

Install with Data Import

Use one of these steps to configure Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service installation with data import from an older version of Unified CM.



Important Fresh Install with Data Import does not support domain name changes. If DNS is enabled on the publisher node of the destination cluster, the domain name must match the source cluster. If the domain name needs to change, install the destination cluster on publisher without the DNS enabled and then enable DNS via the CLI after the installation is complete. The subscribers can be installed with the DNS enabled, but ensure that the **System > Server** entries on the publisher node are correct before installing the subscribers.

If you plan to change the hostname and/or IP address during the migration, the **System > Server** entries must be updated on the publisher node of the destination cluster prior to installing the subscribers.

Before you begin

Run the **utils system upgrade dataexport initiate** CLI command on each node of the desired source system to export the data which can be imported using this procedure. Your source version must be Release 10.5 or higher. If your source version is not Release 12.5(1) SU5 or higher, you need to install the latest version of the "cisco.cm.DataExport" COP file on each node of the source system.

Procedure

Step 1 To configure Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service with **Install with Data Import** follow the instructions as described in [Basic Installation, on page 32](#) from step 1 through 6. Then proceed with the following steps:

- a) In the **Platform Installation Wizard** window, click **Import** to import data from the SFTP server during the Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service installation. The installation process starts with preinstallation and nodes are rebooted.
- b) After reboot, click **OK** in **Import Upgrade Configuration Information** screen.

Reset Application User Passwords

The install process sets all Application User passwords to the same default Application User password that you entered during installation. We recommend that you reset all these passwords post installation.

The details of the application user appear in the **Application User Configuration** window.

Step 6 Repeat this procedure for each application user.

Install the Real-Time Monitoring Tool

Use this procedure to install the Cisco Unified Real-Time Monitoring Tool (RTMT). You can use RTMT to monitor Unified Communications Manager and the IM and Presence Service in real time.

Before you begin

- Unified RTMT requires at least 128 MB in memory to run on a Windows OS platform; the tool requires at least 300 MB of disk space to run on a Windows/Linux OS platform.



Note The Linux Unified RTMT plugin CcmServRtmtPlugin.bin can be installed on RHEL 5, RHEL 6, or higher Linux machines. If you want to install it on a RHEL 4 machine, ensure that the glibc (OS library) version is 2.4.x or higher. If the glibc version is 2.3.x or earlier, the underlying JRE install fails.

- The current Unified RTMT download supports earlier releases of Unified Communications Manager or Cisco Unity Connection. Some releases of Unified Communications Manager may require different versions of Unified RTMT to be installed on your computer (one version per Unified Communications Manager release). Verify that the Unified RTMT version that you install is compatible with the product that you are monitoring. If the Unified RTMT version that you are using is not compatible with the server that you want to monitor, the system prompts you to download the compatible version.
- Your computer stores the user preferences, such as the IP address and Unified RTMT frame size, based on the last instance of Unified RTMT that you run.



Note Only the administrators with Standard Audit Users and Standard CCM Super Users privileges have access to Unified RTMT features. If an application user without these privileges logs into Unified RTMT, some of the features such as Call Control Discovery (CCD) and Service Advertisement Framework (SAF) will not work as expected.



Note On a Linux workstation, run RTMT with root access. Otherwise, when you initially install RTMT, the application will not start.

- The current Unified RTMT requires JRE to run. Verify that the system has JRE installed (Java 1.8).

Procedure

Step 1 Go to the **Plug-ins** window of the administration interface for your configuration:

Interface	How to access
Unified Communications Manager	From Unified Communications Manager Administration, choose Application > Plugins .
Unified Communications Manager IM and Presence Service	From Unified Communications Manager IM and Presence Administration, choose Application > Plugins .
Cisco Unity Connection	From Cisco Unity Connection Administration, choose System Settings > Plugins .

Step 2 Click **Find**.

Step 3 To install Unified RTMT on a client that is running the Microsoft Windows operating system, click the **Download** link for the Real-Time Monitoring Tool - Windows.

To install Unified RTMT on a client that is running the Linux operating system, click the **Download** link for the Real-Time Monitoring Tool - Linux.

Tip When you install Unified RTMT on Windows 7 or later, ensure that you perform the installation as an administrator.

Step 4 Download the executable to the preferred location on your client.

Step 5 To install the Windows version, double-click the Unified RTMT icon that appears on the desktop or locate the directory where you downloaded the file and run the Unified RTMT installation file.

The extraction process begins.

Step 6 To install the Linux version, ensure that the file has execute privileges; for example, enter the following command, which is case sensitive: **chmod +x CcmServRtmtPlugin.bin**.

Step 7 After the Unified RTMT welcome window appears, click **Next**.

Step 8 To accept the license agreement, click **I accept the terms of the license agreement**; then, click **Next**.

Step 9 Choose the absolute path of Java Virtual Machine executable from your system (java.exe from the JRE installed directory, that is latest version 1.8) as prompted in the installation screen of Unified RTMT.

Step 10 Choose the location where you want to install Unified RTMT. If you do not want to use the default location, click **Browse** and navigate to a different location. Click **Next**.

Step 11 To begin the installation, click **Next**.

The **Setup Status** window appears.

Step 12 To complete the installation, click **Finish**.



Note For more details on how to use the Real-Time Monitoring Tool, refer to the *Cisco Unified Real-Time Monitoring Tool Administration Guide*.

Enable the Kerneldump Utility

Use this procedure to enable the kerneldump utility. In the event of a kernel crash, the utility provides a mechanism for collecting and dumping the crash. You can configure the utility to dump the core to either the local server, or to an external server.

Procedure

- Step 1** Log in to the Command Line Interface.
- Step 2** Complete either of the following:
- To dump kernel crashes on the local server, run the `utils os kerneldump enable CLI` command.
 - To dump kernel crashes to an external server, run the `utils os kerneldump ssh enable <ip_address>` CLI command with the IP address of the external server.
- Step 3** Reboot the server.
-

Install Licenses

Make sure that you acquire the necessary licenses.

Unified Communications Manager Requirements

Use Cisco Smart Software Manager or Cisco Smart Software Manager satellite to manage licenses for Unified Communications Manager. For details on how to acquire licenses, see the "Smart Software Licensing" chapter of the [System Configuration Guide for Cisco Unified Communications Manager](#).

IM and Presence Service Requirements

The IM and Presence Service does not require a server license or software version license.

Configure the Backup

We recommend performing regular backups. You can use the Disaster Recovery System (DRS) to do a full data backup for all servers in a cluster. You can set up automatic backups or invoke a backup at any time.

You can initiate a manual backup or configure a backup schedule. For more details, see the "Backup the System" chapter of the [Administration Guide for Cisco Unified Communications Manager](#).

Locale Installation

You can configure Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service to support multiple languages. There is no limit to the number of supported languages you can install.

Cisco provides locale-specific versions of the Unified Communications Manager Locale Installer and the IM and Presence Service Locale Installer on www.cisco.com. Installed by the system administrator, the locale installer allows the user to view/receive the chosen translated text or tones, if applicable, when a user works with supported interfaces.

For upgrades of Unified Communications Manager or the IM & Presence Service, you must install locales after you have completed all your upgrades and migrations. For upgrades, you must reinstall any locales that you are using, except for US-English, which is installed by default. Install the latest version of the locales that match the major.minor version number of your Unified Communications Manager node or IM and Presence Service node.

Install locales after you have installed Unified Communications Manager on every node in the cluster and have set up the database. If you want to install specific locales on IM and Presence Service nodes, you must first install the Unified Communications Manager locale file for the same country on the Unified Communications Manager cluster.

Use the information in the following sections to install locales on Unified Communications Manager nodes and on IM and Presence Service nodes after you complete the software upgrade.

User Locales

User locale files contain language information for a specific language and country. They provide translated text and voice prompts, if available, for phone displays, user applications, and user web pages in the locale that the user chooses. These files use the following naming convention:

- `cm-locale-language-country-version.cop` (Unified Communications Manager)
- `ps- locale-language_country-version.cop` (IM and Presence Service)

Network Locales

Network locale files provide country-specific files for various network items, including phone tones, annunciators, and gateway tones. The combined network locale file uses the following naming convention:

- `cm-locale-combinednetworklocale-version.cop` (Unified Communications Manager)

Cisco may combine multiple network locales in a single locale installer.

You can install locale files from either a local or a remote source by using the same process for installing software upgrades. You can install more than one locale file on each node in the cluster. Changes do not take effect until you reboot every node in the cluster. We strongly recommend that you do not reboot the nodes until you have installed all locales on all nodes in the cluster. Minimize call-processing interruptions by rebooting the nodes after regular business hours.

Install New Locales

Use this procedure to install a new locale on Unified Communications Manager or IM and Presence Service. If you are installing a locale for both products, install the locale on all cluster nodes in the following order:

1. Unified Communications Manager publisher node
2. Unified Communications Manager subscriber nodes
3. IM and Presence database publisher node
4. IM and Presence subscriber nodes

Before you begin

Make sure that you have completed your installation or upgrade of Unified Communications Manager or IM and Presence Service on all cluster nodes before you attempt to install a new locale.

Procedure

- Step 1** Find the locale installer for your release on cisco.com:
- For Unified Communications Manager, go to <https://software.cisco.com/download/navigator.html?mdfid=268439621&i=rm>
 - For IM and Presence Service, go to <https://software.cisco.com/download/navigator.html?mdfid=280448682&i=rm>
- Step 2** Download your release's locale installer to a server that supports SFTP.
- Step 3** Log in to Cisco Unified OS Administration using the administrator account.
- Step 4** Choose **Software Upgrades > Install/Upgrade**.
- Step 5** Complete the following fields in the **Software Installation/Upgrade** window:
- For the **Source**, choose **Remote file System**.
 - From the **Directory**, enter the path to the directory where you saved the locale installer.
 - From the **Server** field, enter the server name for the remote file system.
 - Enter the credentials for the remote file system.
 - From the **Transfer Protocol** drop-down list, choose **SFTP**. You must use SFTP for the transfer protocol.
- Step 6** Click **Next**.
- Step 7** Download and install the locale on the server.
- Step 8** Restart the server. The updates take effect after the server restarts.
- Step 9** Repeat this procedure on all Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service cluster nodes in the prescribed order.
-



- Note** Do not reset user locales for your end users until the new locale is installed on all cluster nodes. If you are installing the locale for both Unified Communications Manager and IM and Presence Service, you must install the locale for both products before you reset user locales. If you run into any issues, such as could occur if an end user resets a phone language before the locale installation is complete for IM and Presence Service, have your users reset their phone language in the Self-Care Portal to English. After the locale installation is complete, users can reset their phone language, or you use Bulk Administration to synchronize locales to the appropriate language by bulk.
-

What to do next

After the locale installation is complete for all cluster nodes, your end users can begin using the new user locale.

Error Messages

See the following table for a description of the messages that can occur during Locale Installer activation. If an error occurs, you can view the messages in the installation log.

Table 3: Locale Installer Error Messages and Descriptions

Message	Description
[LOCALE] File not found: <language>_<country>_user_locale.csv, the user locale has not been added to the database.	This error occurs when the system cannot locate the CSV file, which contains user locale information to add to the database. This indicates an error with the build process.
[LOCALE] File not found: <country>_network_locale.csv, the network locale has not been added to the database.	This error occurs when the system cannot locate the CSV file, which contains network locale information to add to the database. This indicates an error with the build process.
[LOCALE] Communications Manager CSV file installer installdb is not present or not executable.	This error occurs because a Unified Communications Manager application called installdb must be present; it reads information that is contained in a CSV file and applies it correctly to the Unified Communications Manager database. If this application is not found, it either was not installed with Unified Communications Manager (very unlikely), has been deleted (more likely), or the node does not have Unified Communications Manager installed (most likely). Installation of the locale terminates because locales do not work without the correct records that are held in the database.
[LOCALE] Could not create /usr/local/cm/application_locale/cmservices/ipma/com/cisco/ipma/client/locales/maDialogs_<ll>_<CC>.properties.Checksum. [LOCALE] Could not create /usr/local/cm/application_locale/cmservices/ipma/com/cisco/ipma/client/locales/maMessages_<ll>_<CC>.properties.Checksum. [LOCALE] Could not create /usr/local/cm/application_locale/cmservices/ipma/com/cisco/ipma/client/locales/maGlobalUI_<ll>_<CC>.properties.Checksum. [LOCALE] Could not create /usr/local/cm/application_locale/cmservices/ipma/LocaleMasterVersion.txt.Checksum.	These errors could occur when the system fails to create a checksum file; causes can include an absent Java executable, /usr/local/thirdparty/java/j2sdk/jre/bin/java, an absent or damaged Java archive file, /usr/local/cm/jar/cmutil.jar, or an absent or damaged Java class, com.cisco.ccm.util.Zipper. Even if these errors occur, the locale will continue to work correctly, with the exception of Unified Communications Manager Assistant, which cannot detect a change in localized Unified Communications Manager Assistant files.

Message	Description
[LOCALE] Could not find /usr/local/cm/application_locale/cmsservices/ipma/LocaleMaster Version.txt in order to update UnifiedCMAssistant locale information.	This error occurs when the file does not get found in the correct location, which is most likely due to an error in the build process.
[LOCALE] Addition of <RPM-file-name> to the Unified Communications Manager database has failed!	This error occurs because of the collective result of any failure that occurs when a locale is being installed; it indicates a terminal condition.

COP File Installation Guidelines

Depending on your installation, you may need to install a COP file after the installation to fix a known defect, or to enable support for a custom device type that you want to use that does not ship with Unified Communications Manager.

If you need to install a COP file, follow these guidelines:

- Install the appropriate COP file on every node in a cluster. Perform this task before you install new software on each node in the cluster and after set up the database.
- After you install a COP file, you must restart the node.
- Restart Unified Communications Manager and/or the IM and Presence Service to ensure that configuration changes that are made during the COP file installation get written into the database.

Install a COP File

If you want to use a prebuilt Dial Plan other than the North American Numbering Plan (the system default), you must install a COP file with your dial plan.

Procedure

-
- Step 1** Begin this procedure on the Unified Communications Manager publisher node. From Cisco Unified Communications OS Administration, choose **Software Upgrades > Install**. The **Software Installation/Upgrade** window appears.
- Step 2** In the **Source** field, choose **Remote File System**.
- Step 3** Configure the fields on the **Software Installation/Upgrade** window. See the Related Topics for more information about the fields and their configuration options.
- Step 4** Click **Next**.
The window refreshes with a list of available software options and upgrades.
- Step 5** From the **Options/Upgrades** drop-down list, choose the **DP COP** file and click **Next**.
The **Installation File** window opens and downloads the file from the FTP server. The window displays the progress of the download.
- Step 6** When the **Checksum** window appears, verify the checksum value against the checksum for the file that you downloaded.

- Step 7** Click **Next** to proceed with the software upgrade.
A warning message displays the DP COP file that you selected to install.
- Step 8** Click **Install**.
The **Install Status** window appears.
- Step 9** Click **Finish**.
- Step 10** Repeat this procedure on the Unified Communications Manager subscriber nodes. You must install the COP file on all the nodes in the cluster.

Install a Prebuilt Dial Plan

Install the national numbering plan on each Unified Communications Manager node in the cluster beginning with the Unified Communications Manager publisher node.



Note Complete this procedure only if you are installing a national numbering plan for countries outside of North America (the system default).

Procedure

-
- Step 1** From Cisco Unified Communications Manager Administration, choose **Call Routing > Dial Plan Installer**.
- Step 2** Enter search criteria and click **Find**.
- Step 3** Choose the dial plan version that you want to install from the **Available Version** drop-down list.
- Step 4** Click **Install**.
The Status displays that the dial plan has been installed.
- Step 5** Repeat this procedure for every subscriber node in the cluster.

Restart the Cisco CallManager Service

If you have installed a new dial plan, you must restart the Cisco CallManager service.

Procedure

- Step 1** From the Cisco Unified Serviceability interface, choose **Tools > Control Center - Feature Services**.
 - Step 2** Choose the Unified Communications Manager server from the **Servers** drop-down list. In the CM Services area, Cisco CallManager displays in the **Service Name** column.
 - Step 3** Click the radio button that corresponds to the Cisco CallManager service.
 - Step 4** Click **Restart**.
The service restarts and displays the message, *Service Successfully Restarted*.

Activate Security

If you want to enable security on your system, you must install the Cisco CTL Client and enable mixed mode. You can download the CTL installation file in Cisco Unified CM Administration from the **Applications > Plugins** window.

When mixed mode is enabled, the system uses the Certificate Trust List (CTL) file for authentication. The CTL file contains a server certificate, public key, serial number, signature, issuer name, subject name, server function, DNS name, and IP address for each server.

Configure the Simple Network Management Protocol

If you are using a Network Management System, such as Cisco Prime Collaboration Assurance, enable the Simple Network Management Protocol.

Before you begin

Your system does not allow more than ten concurrent polling queries. We recommend a maximum of eight trap destinations; anything higher will affect CPU performance. This requirement applies to all installations regardless of the OVA template that you use.

Procedure

- Step 1** Install and configure the SNMP NMS.
- Step 2** In the **Control Center - Network Services** window, verify that the system started the SNMP services.
- Step 3** Unified Communications Manager: In the **Service Activation** window, activate the Cisco CallManager SNMP service. Cisco Unity Connection only: The Connection SNMP Agent service automatically activates.
- Step 4** If you are using SNMP V1/V2c, configure the community string.
- Step 5** If you are using SNMP V3, get the SNMP Engine. You will need it when configuring an SNMP User
- Step 6** If you are using SNMP V3, configure the SNMP user.
- Step 7** Configure the notification destination for traps or informs.
- Step 8** Configure the system contact and location for the MIB2 system group.
- Step 9** Configure trap settings for CISCO-SYSLOG-MIB.

- Step 10** Unified Communications Manager only: Configure trap settings for CISCO-CCM-MIB.
- Step 11** Restart the Primary Agent service.
- Step 12** On the NMS, configure the Unified Communications Manager trap parameters.

Change Virtual Machine Configuration Specifications

Use the following procedure to change to the Guest OS version in the Unified Communications Manager virtual machine (VM) settings.

Procedure

- Step 1** Shut down the virtual machine.
- Step 2** Change the configuration of the virtual machine as needed through vSphere. You can update the Guest OS and VM Hardware Compatibly.
- a. Update VM Hardware Compatibly—Left click Virtual Machine. Check for *Updates*. Click **Update**

Note If you are not aware of the host click **Check status** and click **Upgrade** to match host.
 - b. Update Guest OS—Right click the **Virtual Machine** > **Edit Settings** > **Virtual Machine Option** > **General Option** > **Guest OS Version**.
- Step 3** Power on the Virtual Machine.
- Note** Following warning messages appears in ESXi while opening the Virtual Machine settings while running when there is a mismatch.
- Warning** The configured guest OS (CentOS 4/5 or later (64 bit)) for this virtual machine does not match the guest that is currently running (CentOS 7 (64 bit)). You should specify the correct guest OS to allow for guest-specific optimizations.

Postinstall tasks for the IM and Presence Service

If you have installed a new cluster or new node for the IM and Presence Service, complete these tasks after your installation.

Activate services

You must activate the following services:

- Cisco SIP Proxy

- Cisco Presence Engine
- Cisco XCP Connection Manager
- Cisco XCP Authentication Service

To activate the services, select **Tools > Service Activation** in Cisco Unified Serviceability.



Note You must complete this task on each server that you install in an IM and Presence cluster.

Network Errors During Installation

During the installation process, the installation program verifies that the server can successfully connect to the network by using the network configuration that you enter. If it cannot connect, a message displays, and you get prompted to select one of the following options:

- —RETRY - The installation program tries to validate networking again. If validation fails again, the error dialog box displays again.
- —REVIEW (Check Install) - This option allows you to review and modify the networking configuration. When detected, the installation program returns to the network configuration windows.
- Networking gets validated after you complete each networking window, so the message might display multiple times.
- —HALT - The installation halts. You should use the Recovery CD to recover the logs to access the diagnostic information. For more details, see [Obtain and Run Recovery Software on the CUCM VM](#).



Note We no longer support the collection of logs by dumping them to serial port due to CentOS limitations.

- —IGNORE - The installation continues. The networking error gets logged. Sometimes, the installation program validates networking multiple times, so this error dialog box might display multiple times. If you choose to ignore network errors, the installation may fail.

Steps to Recover Logs using Recovery CD

You should use the Recovery CD to recover the logs to access the diagnostic information. Follow the steps mentioned:

1. Insert the recovery CD.

2. Reboot the system.
3. Once the recovery CD menu comes up, press Alt + F2 to get to the command prompt.
4. Find the largest partition by performing a "df -h". (/mnt/part6).
5. Locate the install logs at: /mnt/part6/log/install/ directory.
6. Collect the logs.

Failed Installations

If your installation fails, check the configuration and confirm the following:

- Parse the passwords from the platformconfig.xml file to verify security password.
- Complete a packet capture from Unified Communications Manager to confirm that the IM and Presence Service IP address is reaching Unified Communications Manager during the install.
- Verify that NTP is synchronized on Unified Communications Manager.
- If you get a message that install has failed and you want to recover the logs to access the diagnostic information, see [Obtain and Run Recovery Software on the CUCM VM](#).



Note We no longer support the collection of logs by dumping them to serial port due to CentOS limitations.

- Confirm that the version of the IM and Presence Service and Unified Communications Manager are compatible.
- If you are installing a subscriber, verify that the subscriber node is the same version as the publisher node. The subscriber OVA should be the same OVA that is used for the publisher.

Unrecoverable IM and Presence Service Node

If a node is in a state that cannot be recovered you must reinstall the node.



Note If you reinstall a node in an intercluster deployment, you must delete and re-add the intercluster peer connections between the reinstalled node and the other nodes in the cluster.

IM and Presence Service Database Publisher Node

Complete the following high-level procedure to reinstall an IM and Presence Service database publisher node.



Note If you do not complete all of these steps in the order shown, recovery of the IM and Presence Service database publisher node will fail.

1. Power down all the IM and Presence Service subscriber nodes.
2. Delete the subscriber nodes as follows:
 - a. Unassign all users that are assigned to each of the IM and Presence Service subscriber nodes. (Select **Cisco Unified CM Administration > User Management > Assign Presence Users**).
 - b. Remove the subscriber nodes from their presence redundancy groups. (Select **Cisco Unified CM Administration > System > Presence Redundancy Groups**).
 - c. Delete the subscriber nodes from the Unified Communications Manager server list. (Select **Cisco Unified CM Administration > System > Server**).
3. Power down the IM and Presence Service database publisher node.
4. Delete the IM and Presence Service database publisher node as follows:
 - a. Unassign the users that are assigned to the IM and Presence Service database publisher node. (Select **Cisco Unified CM Administration > User Management > Assign Presence Users**).
 - b. Remove the node from the presence redundancy group. (Select **Cisco Unified CM Administration > System > Presence Redundancy Groups**).
 - c. Delete the IM and Presence Service database publisher node from the Unified Communications Manager server list. (Select **Cisco Unified CM Administration > System > Server**).
5. Readd the IM and Presence Service database publisher node to the Unified Communications Manager server list.
6. Perform a fresh install of the IM and Presence Service database publisher node.
7. Readd the IM and Presence Service subscriber nodes to the Unified Communications Manager server list.
8. Perform a fresh install of each subscriber node.

IM and Presence Service Subscriber Node

Complete the following high-level procedure to reinstall an IM and Presence Service subscriber node.



Note If you do not complete all of these steps in the order shown, recovery of the IM and Presence Service subscriber node will fail.

1. Power down the IM and Presence Service node.
2. Delete the subscriber node as follows:
 - a. Unassign the users that are assigned to the node. (Select **Cisco Unified CM Administration > User Management > Assign Presence Users**).
